 - Privately Funded by DeMoulas Foundation as "Friend of the MRC"
 - Additional site improvements proposed for their continuing support
- Exterior Site ADA Accessibility & Furniture
 - Summer 2009 Summer 2013
 - Somerville Ave. Reconstruction & Improvements
 - Water Source brought to site for landscaping
 - Attractive Benches & Trash Barrels provided inside & outside
 - Electricity made available internal to site
 - Funding from a mix of State, Federal and City grants

- Public Programming Offered:

Preservation Master Plan Update

- ✓ Restore Perimeter Fencing and Gates
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Highest Priorities Outstanding

- <u>Rehabilitation of Remaining Tombs</u>
- 2 tombs were repaired in 2006 as a demonstration project
- The remaining 6 tombs have not been addressed at all
- Their condition has deteriorated gravely, causing a serious public safety hazard and inevitable irreparable harm to their integrity
- Grant application to the MHC in 2012 for their repair was not funded, largely due to uncertain City match and reduced competitiveness

- City funds for historic preservation projects scarce
